Proper 15 – 16th August 2020 – 10th Sunday after Trinity



This morning we have held our first Sunday Eucharist in church for nearly 5 months. As I got up earlier this morning than I have on a Sunday for months there felt something like normality. It was far from normal with less people there and no hymns to sing, no moving around and no gathering of people at the end but it was peaceful and reflective.

Peaceful reflective worship always takes my mind to a style of worship used by the Taize community. It is 80 years this year since Brother Roger founded a community of monks in Taize, an area of Burgundy in France. The community's strong devotion to peace and justice only heightened the horror when 15 years ago today Brother Roger, at the age of 90 was murdered by one of the attendees during the evening prayer service. It is now a 100 strong community of monks from over 30 countries. Tens of thousands of mainly young people are drawn there each year to share in the ecumenical community's simple way of life, to study the bible and to share in its traditional contemplative prayer and meditative silence that is a huge part of the Taize experience. The singing of distinctive and much-repeated prayer chants during candlelit prayer services is also one of its trademarks. The simple repeated words are designed to help meditation and prayer. On zoom our intercessions today will have a Taize style to them. With the lovely melody and simple words of the Taize chant, 'O Lord hear my prayer' sung between each prayer and a time of short silence for your own meditation and prayer. I have printed the words for you to say if you wish to use them.

Our Gospel reading relates one of the many healing miracles of Jesus. The Canaanite women outright asks Jesus for help, after ignoring her initially, Jesus' eventual reply seems cold and harsh, and almost derogatory, referring to her as a dog. As we so often have to do when reading the bible we have to look to the language of the time. At that time the Jews referred to the gentiles as dogs. Both the disciples and the woman would have understood the metaphor and Jesus' comment only serves to make the woman more persistent. Having tested her enough, Jesus is confident of the strength of the woman's faith and he heals her tormented daughter. Sometimes we too have to ask. Many of us were raised in an era when it was impolite to 'ask' for anything, but, as with the woman God tests us too. We too need to be persistent in our asking for us to see results. During the Taize style intercessions, having read the words of the prayer, don't be afraid to use the quiet time to outright ask God to help with the things that mean the most to you – God may just be testing the strength of your faith.

Collect for the day

Let your merciful ears, O Lord, be open to the prayers of your humble servants; and that they may obtain their petitions make them to ask such things as shall please you; through Jesus Christ your Son our Lord, who is alive and reigns with you, in the unity of the Holy sspirit, one God, now and forever. Amen

Thus says the LORD:

besides those already gathered.


A reading from the letter of Paul to the Romans

I ask, then, has God rejected his people? By no means! I myself am an Israelite, a descendant of Abraham, a member of the tribe of Benjamin. ² God has not rejected his people whom he foreknew.

For the gifts and the calling of God are irrevocable. ³⁰ Just as you were once disobedient to God but have now received mercy because of their disobedience, ³¹ so they have now been disobedient in order that, by the mercy shown to you, they too may no^w receive mercy. ³² For God has imprisoned all in disobedience so that he may be merciful to all.

A reading from the Gospel according to Matthew

²¹ Jesus left that place and went away to the district of Tyre and Sidon. ²² Just then a Canaanite woman from that region came out and started shouting, "Have mercy on me, Lord, Son of David; my daughter is tormented by a demon." ²³ But he did not answer her at all. And his disciples came and urged him, saying, "Send her away, for she keeps shouting after us." ²⁴ He answered, "I was sent only to the lost sheep of the house of Israel." ²⁵ But she came and knelt before him, saying, "Lord, help me." ²⁶ He answered, "It is not fair to take the children's food and throw it to the dogs." ²⁷ She said, "Yes, Lord, yet even the dogs eat the crumbs that fall from their masters' table." ²⁸ Then Jesus answered her, "Woman, great is your faith! Let it be done for you as you wish." And her daughter was healed instantly.



Words from Fr Rodney

Under normal circumstances, this Sunday we would have been celebrating the festival of the Blessed Virgin Mary who's special day was vesterday. Sadly due to the controversies of the Reformation, and the need to restore balance to the Christian faith that had become distorted over the centuries, the reformed Christian tradition over compensated, and Mary no longer had a living place within the life of the Church. The passage of time has allowed for Mary to again have a more significant place within our worship and her festivals have been restored. But apart from Christmas with the plethora of nativity plays etc. she still has not regained that place in many Christian hearts as the person who embodies what Christian discipleship is all about. We give thanks for Mary's faith, and pray that our own faith may grow to reflect the gualities of hers, and that we may be open to God and become the "Mary like" disciples He needs us to be in the world today.
