The Third Sunday of Epiphany -24th January 2021



On this 3rd Sunday in Epiphany we hear of Jesus' first miracle, the changing of water into wine, we meet Jesus at the very start of His ministry.

Today also marks the Sunday in the Week of Prayer for Christian Unity. As part of this, today we will begin our worship with a short liturgy mostly taken from the excellent resources put together by Churches Together in Britain and Ireland but with the addition of music sung by Joe Fernandes, taken from an excellent video, prepared especially for this week of prayer and posted by the Society of Pilar Bhopal, a charity working with children and young people and associated with the Catholic church in Bhopal, India.

The Week of Prayer for Christian Unity in 2021 has been prepared by the Monastic Community of Grandchamp in Switzerland. The theme is "Abide in my love and you shall bear much fruit", it expresses Grandchamp Community's vocation to prayer, reconciliation and unity in the Church and the human family. The Grandchamp Community has its origins in Europe in the 1930s, when a group of women of the Reformed tradition sought to rediscover the importance of silence and listening to the Word of God. Today the community has fifty sisters, all women from different generations, Church traditions, countries and continents. They remain faithful to a life of prayer, life in community and the welcoming of guests. The sisters share the grace of their monastic life with visitors and volunteers who go to Grandchamp for a time of retreat, silence, healing or in search of meaning.

Collect for the day

A reading from the Revelation to John

A reading from the Gospel according to John

2 On the third day there was a wedding in Cana of Galilee, and the mother of Jesus was there. ² Jesus and his disciples had also been invited to the wedding. ³ When the wine gave out, the mother of Jesus said to him, "They have no wine." 4 And Jesus said to her, "Woman, what concern is that to you and to me? My hour has not yet come." 5 His mother said to the servants, "Do whatever he tells you." 6 Now standing there were six stone water jars for the Jewish rites of purification, each holding twenty or thirty gallons. ⁷ Jesus said to them, "Fill the jars with water." And they filled them up to the brim. 8 He said to them, "Now draw some out, and take it to the chief steward." So they took it. 9 When the steward tasted the water that had become wine, and did not know where it came from (though the servants who had drawn the water knew), the steward called the bridegroom ¹⁰ and said to him, "Everyone serves the good wine first, and then the inferior wine after the guests have become drunk. But you have kept the good wine until now." 11 Jesus did this, the first of his signs, in Cana of Galilee, and revealed his glory; and his disciples believed in him.

What is a miracle? This is a question I have asked myself throughout my ministry. I have gradually come to the conclusion that there are at least two kinds of miracles, those for which there is a possible explanation, and those for which there is no explanation except that they are 'miracles'. Our gospel reading for today is one for which there seems to be no simple explanation! But does the miracle just lie in Jesus turning the water into wine, or as St. John indicates does it more importantly point to something about who Jesus is in this His first miracle? It may well be that Jesus did indeed turn the water into wine, but what was also important was that He transformed what would have been seen as sign of disapproval from God of this marriage, into something that was an even greater sign of His blessing. The very controversial Bishop of Durham, the late Bishop David Jenkins, taught me many things and one of them was to look for God at work in what most people would regard as very ordinary things, rather than just in the miraculous situations. When it came to this first miracle at Cana in Galilee, he would have said not just to focus on the miracle of the changing of water into wine, but the greater miracle of transforming what would have been seen as a sign of God's disapproval into an even greater blessing because Jesus was there! So here is a message for us today, to have Jesus as a living part of our lives not only blesses our lives, but can even transform potential disasters into even greater blessings!

Intercessions Let us pray

As we come together at the end of a week focusing on Christian unity, we think of Christians throughout the world also worshiping in many languages and contexts, reminding us that there is unity in the midst of our different traditions. We pray today that this unity inspires us to work together for a better understanding and acceptance of one another, so that we may be the example of tolerance and reconciliation that you would want us to be. We ask you to bless the efforts of all those working for unity within our own Christian communities and beyond and we thank you for the opportunity we have had these past months to share our faith with other churches and traditions, praying that these links remain strong in the future. Amen

Today we bring before you our world in desperate need of unity and reconciliation at this time. We pray that we are able to build bridges with

peoples of other faiths and non, working together to tear down the walls of indifference and hatred that so blight our world today. We ask you to bless our own government and leaders throughout the nations with the wisdom and will to work for justice and solidarity. Today we also pray particularly for the new leadership of the United States as they try to heal the divisions that have caused so much pain in recent times. Amen Today we pray for our families, friends and neighbours and thank you for all the many examples of people working in unity for the good of others that we have witnessed this week. We ask you to bless those who have volunteered to deliver the vaccine within our communities, those who work in our local health and social services and all those key workers sustaining our daily lives at the moment. We pray for their safety and the safety of their loved ones. As our lockdown continues we ask your blessings on all those we cannot see and in the words of Amanda Gorman's timely poem, help us to draw strength from the hope that 'in this time of everlasting shade....'our common faith reminds us... 'There is always light, if only we are brave enough to see it, if only we are brave enough to be it.' Amen

Today father we bring before you those who are suffering in body, mind or spirit especially all those who are suffering from the pandemic, those who care for them and their loved ones, those who are lonely, anxious and in pain, as well as any we wish to pray for particularly today We also ask for your blessings on the vaccination roll out and pray that it safely and effectively helps us in our fight against the virus. Amen

Finally Father, we remember today all those who have gone before us, those who have died recently, especially in the pandemic, those whose anniversaries are around this time and any we wish to pray for today... we thank you for their love, friendship and our memories of them and we pray for comfort and peace for their loved ones. Finally, remembering God's gift of hope brought to us in the form of his son, we ask that they rest in peace and rise in glory. Amen

Today we end with a blessing typically used by the Sisters of the Grandchamp Community.

May the God of hope fill us with all joy and all peace in faith, so that we may abound in hope by the power of the Holy Spirit. In the name of the Father, the Son and the Holy Spirit. Amen.
